
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

## PRIVACY RULE

# history

The Privacy Rule prohibits covered entities and business associates from using or disclosing protected health information except as HIPAA requires or permits



A person who knowingly and in violation of this part –

(1) uses or causes to be used a unique health identifier;

(2) obtains individually identifiable health information relating to an individual; or

(3) discloses individually identifiable health information to another person, shall be punished . . . .

**DOJ Opinion:** 

"covered entity"

#### violation

**DOJ Opinion:** 

"knowingly" means person knew facts – not that conduct violated the law

#### violation

DOJ Opinion: no direct violation for causing another to violate hipaa

**DOJ Opinion:** aiding and abetting liability

"aids, abets, counsels, commands, induces, . . . crime"


